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Message from NEMPAC's Board President



On behalf of the Board of Directors, I sincerely *Thank You* for your generosity and support that you have extended to NEMPAC throughout the year. Music instruction for all ages, a variety of concerts throughout the year, a professional Opera and The Messiah at Faneuil Hall were made possible because you believe in NEMPAC! An organization's success is measured by its leadership. We commend our Executive Director Sherri Snow, for her dedication to NEMPAC and ensuring that her staff and music instructors are the very best in the City of Boston.

2019 was a banner year for NEMPAC! We were successful in winning the bid for a 15-year lease from the City of Boston for 48-50 Tileston Street, formerly known as the Pauline Agassiz Shaw House. Through a bid and selection process, the Board hired James J. Welch & Co., Inc. and Peterman Architects, Inc., to design and build a state-of-the art music school, to be occupied in September 2020. In addition, JBF Consulting guided us in the creation of a Fundraising Capital Campaign and Case for Support.

- We welcomed Leigh Ann Steele, a Charlestown resident and parent of three NEMPAC students to the Board of Directors. Leigh Ann's knowledge of Charlestown will be helpful, since NEMPAC's enrollment in Charlestown has increased tremendously.
- The Little Prince Opera was presented at the Great Hall, Faneuil Hall, in June. Our sincere Thank You to the talented artists, NEMPAC Youth Choir, Artistic Director Alexandra Dietrich, Music Director & Conductor Tiffany Chang, co-presenters and sponsors who made this performance successful.
- The Fourth Annual Cornhole Tournament in May was bigger, better and lots of fun! Over \$20,000 was raised for "The Geraldine Marshall Scholarship Fund". Thank you to all who supported and we look forward to another successful and fun 2020 Tournament!
- A special "Thank You" to Board Member, Ramin Khoshatefeh, who graciously hosts our Winter Concert Performances and recitals at the Bijou de la Vida Art Gallery. We truly would not have performance space without the generosity of Ramin.
- Our fifth annual performance of Handel's Messiah was held in Faneuil Hall. Conductor Christopher Wilkins of the Boston Landmarks Orchestra, One City Choir, and the NEMPAC Children's Choir presented the perfect performance for our holiday season. Thank you all who made it a huge success. The Messiah was again sponsored by the Frattaroli Family in Loving Memory of their son, Mark F. Frattaroli.

Dear Friends,

When I look back on the past fiscal year, I'm most proud of the new synergies we've created between our community music school and performing arts center.

This synergy was on full display during NEMPAC's 2019 Opera Project. For the first time in the production's eight-year history, we cast a youth ensemble alongside professional artists.

I was awed and amazed as I watched the elementary-school lead, Linus Schafer, perform alongside the best of Boston's opera singers during the production of Antoine de Saint Exúpery's "The Little Prince" Opera. The young boy who joined NEMPAC's youth choir several years ago was now a rising artist embarking upon his first professional youth role.

Positioned at the intersection of arts education and performance, NEMPAC creates opportunities for rising artists like Linus to share the stage with professional musicians. In doing so, NEMPAC propels artists of all ages and abilities forward into the next phases of their musical journeys.

Throughout the past fiscal year, we built upon this track record of nurturing the next generation of artists, as well as furthering the careers of professional musicians and performers:

- We unveiled a new partnership with Harvard Kent BPS Elementary School, bringing private music instruction in piano, voice, and ukulele to Charlestown students.
- We engaged 100-plus soloists and professional musicians throughout the 18/19
 performance season, hosting concerts, musical projects, and recitals for thousands of
 patrons.
- We co-presented Handel's Messiah Part I to over 400 community members in collaboration with the Boston Landmarks Orchestra and One City Choir, hosting the most well-attended concert in the program's history.

As we cast an eye toward the future, we look forward to continuing to identify new ways to integrate arts education and professional performance.

In the process, we'll empower artists like Linus to stretch themselves musically, develop personally, and give back to their communities.

Who We Are

North End Music & Performing Arts Center (NEMPAC) is a 501(c)(3) community music school and performing arts center empowering greater-Boston artists of all ages and abilities. Fueled by the belief that the arts are an expression of our shared humanity, NEMPAC enriches the North End, Charlestown and surrounding Boston neighborhoods with affordable, high-quality performances and programming.

In 2001, five North End mothers launched NEMPAC out of their homes to give their daughters and sons the opportunity to pursue private piano instruction. By meeting a community need for youth instrument lessons, the nonprofit's female founders banded together to make music an approachable art form for the children of Little Italy.

Fast forward nearly two decades later, and NEMPAC continues to flourish where arts education converges with professional performance.

As we journey on our quest to make creative movement, music, performing arts, theatre, and voice accessible to all, we remain steadfast in our commitment to fostering an organizational culture of inclusivity.

One of the ways we foster a culture of inclusivity is by providing music school scholarships to youth.

What We Do Community Music School

Private and Group Music Instruction

NEMPAC's faculty members realize the potential in every student to be a musician and performer. Faculty members meet students where they are on their artistic journeys, providing private and group music instruction for:

- Clarinet, Flute,
- Saxophone, Trombone, Trumpet
- Guitar, Ukelele
- Violin, Viola, Cello

- Percussion, Drums
- Piano, Group Keyboard
- Voice

What We Do Performing Arts Center

As a performing arts center, NEMPAC transforms urban settings into nontraditional performance spaces and hosts concerts, musical projects, and recitals in city communities. NEMPAC brings local, national, as well as international solo acts and professional music groups to greater-Boston stages, integrating city landscapes with the arts.

Jazz in the Park

For the 2nd summer season back in the Rose Kennedy Greenway Parcel 10 in the North End, NEMPAC hosted its free summer concert series, acquainting over 4,000 community members to the genre of contemporary jazz. The series had been presented in the Prado for many years prior.

Jazz in the Park 2018 featured Italian music from Scanzonati, lyrical jazz by Marco Pignataro Jazzet, a Brazilian-inspired performance by Receita De Samba, and New Orleans compositions by Dirty Water Brass Band.

Against a backdrop of lush green grass and vivid summer skies, the outdoor concert venue invited employees, families, and neighbors to listen to diverse styles of jazz music in a relaxed atmosphere.

What We Do Performing Arts Center

NEMPAC Opera Project

NEMPAC's grandest production, the annual Opera Project, connects the greater-Boston community to this classical musical genre. The 2019 Opera Project featured a staged production of Antoine de Saint Exúpery's "The Little Prince" by Rachel Portman.

The 2019 Opera Project was the first in the project's eight-year history to feature an opera written by a female composer. In addition, the project united youth ensemble members and professional musicians, creating meaningful opportunities for both rising and seasoned artists to learn from and teach one another.

Hosted at the Christopher Columbus Park (*rain location St. Stephen's Church*) and Faneuil Hall's The Great Hall, the 2019 Opera Project transfigured urban settings into productions to bring opera to diverse audiences and foster inclusivity.

"There are many steps to pursuing the arts for a career and the lessons and instruction that NEMPAC provides are those first few steps of discovery that spark joy in singing, playing musical instruments, dancing, and acting. To have our students have the important roles of the narrators and as the Little Prince, so beautifully brought to life by Linus Schafer Goulthorpe and Clare Cho, who sing throughout the entire opera, we, as a company and community, are telling these students that they are the future of Boston Arts and that both their voices deserve to be heard and that their hearts and joy deserve to be celebrated alongside professional performers onstage, in the orchestra, and behind the scenes in the technical aspect of theatre. These professionals can provide mentorship, guidance, and friendships that instill confidence and growth in our young performers on their arts education journey.

My hope for our audience was that I would see the largest age range that we've ever had in the audience and we achieved that in the most wonderful of ways! Entire families were able to attend together knowing that the music and story would reach any age - families were also supported in knowing that we want you to come as you are and enjoy the music and story! That enjoyment means you can laugh, wiggle in your seat, and openly enjoy without fear of making noise and being shushed.

For the performers and musicians in the audience, my commitment to us producing a work by a female composer was audibly lauded at the curtain speech on opening night. We inspire our students by creating more gender parity in a world where female composers do not have their works performed frequently - who knows which little girl in our audience saw "The Little Prince", learned that a woman composed that gorgeous score, and went home inspired to write down a song she made up on her own? We are telling all our students that they can do anything in the Arts and I can't wait for us to perform music created by NEMPAC's very own young musicians."

What We Do Performing Arts Center

Winter Concert Series

NEMPAC's Winter Concert Series transforms city spaces—from schools to private art galleries to restaurants—into one-of-a-kind stages. These chamber music recitals are designed to break down barriers between artists and audience members, fostering a neighborhood-wide appreciation of classical music.

The 18/19 Winter Concert Series featured "Classical Hits for Cello and Piano" at North Bennet Street School, a "Composers of Boston" program and Neave Trio's performance of "French Moments" at Bijou de la Vida Gallery, as well as "Amore," NEMPAC's annual Valentine's Dinner Concert, at Lucia Ristorante.

"In the 2018-19 series alone, we supported 12 local performing artists by giving them opportunities not only to perform, but to connect and network with the local community of the North End. Due to the intimate, conversational aspect of our series, the audience and the artists often stay in touch and these networks lead to future concerts and engagements. This kind of work is imperative in Boston and the North End, if music and the arts are to continue to flourish in our region. These chamber music opportunities are actually rare in the Boston community, and classical musicians across Greater Boston now know about NEMPAC's Concert Series. This series is truly unique, due to the rarity of chamber series that connect directly to an educational community organization such as NEMPAC, in that it provides top-level professional programming in an elegant, artistic, yet relaxed and welcoming environment."

We have built such a strong sense of community after several seasons of running the Concert Series, which I believe has been curated and developed over time thanks to the guarantee of top-level musicians invited to perform and carefully crafted thematic programs. We have several patrons who attend these concerts on a regular basis, and have many new faces for each event. We strongly believe that when the artists speak before each work, and describe the musical history before the audience experiences it in performance, that this is a large factor that contributes to a connection between the audience and the performers. The sense of community is also helped by beautiful receptions and slightly longer intermissions, which gives the audience a chance to talk about the music with the artists and with each other, as well as an opportunity to meet new people.

Handel's Messiah - Annual Holiday Concert

In collaboration with the Boston Landmarks Orchestra and One City Choir, NEMPAC copresents its annual holiday concert, Handel's Messiah Part I. The concert is free to the public, ensuring all can partake in commemorating the holidays through music and performance.

During the fourth annual holiday concert, NEMPAC's Youth Choir performed alongside the Boston Landmarks Orchestra and 65 One City Choir members for a sold-out and standing room only performance at St. Leonard's Church.

Key Achievements

- **NEW BUILDING Awarded:** The City of Boston and Mayor Walsh awarded a new 2,200 square foot facility located at 48-50 Tileston to NEMPAC through an RFP process
- **SIGNAGE INSTALLATION:** We installed and funded two new beautiful building signs by New England Signs that add visibility to our current facility
- ROSE KENNEDY GREENWAY PARTNERSHIP: Jazz in the Park series presented in the Greenway North End Park, Parcel 10
- **SCHOOL PARTNERSHIP EXPANSION:** New partnership with Harvard Kent School in Charlestown and Charlestown Community Impact Fund Grant to support growth.
- **CREATION OF VISION STATEMENT:** We envision vibrant Boston neighborhoods where music and performing arts fill the streets with creativity, spark connections, and inspire us to be our best selves.
- MAJOR GIFT FROM THE STATE: Commonwealth of MA awarded \$200,000 to NEMPAC's Capital Campaign.
- WELCOMED TWO NEW BOARD MEMBERS: Treasurer and local North End resident Carl Hall joined the board in Fall 2018, and Charlestown Resident Leigh-Ann Steele joined the board in June 2019.



Where We're Going

As we embark upon our 19th year of operation, we are continually inspired by the community's participation in and support of our arts programming and professional performances. Waitlists abound for our in-house education courses, as well as private and group music instruction. Local schools are knocking on our doors, asking us to bring arts education to elementary, middle, and high-school students. Demand for our concerts, musical projects, and recitals is at an all-time high, making it challenging at times to find designated performance space that meets audience capacity.

We are humbled to say that the community's demand for our offerings has surpassed the physical space available at our headquarters in the North End's Paul Revere Mall. Our current physical home—a 570 square foot washhouse—has served us extraordinarily well during this chapter of our organization's growth. But now it is time to turn the page and write the next chapter of our 501(c)(3)'s book in a new home that will empower us to bring music and performing arts—as well as the sense of belonging and community that these disciplines foster—to even more community members.

To that end, the City of Boston recently declared NEMPAC the winning bidder of a 15-year lease for 48-50 Tileston Street (formerly known as the Shaw House). We will transform this 2,200 square foot property into the Tileston Music Center, a state-of-the-art facility that will fuel our growth.

July 2019: The Commonwealth of Massachusetts Ways & Means granted NEMPAC \$200,000 toward capital campaign

November 2019: NEMPAC hired Design / Build team JJ Welch and Peterman Architects

January 2020: NEMPAC submitted a grant to Massachusetts Cultural Council Facilities Fund requesting \$150,000 in support for construction

February / March 2020: Building permits finalized

April 2020: NEMPAC will begin construction on 48-50 Tileston Street
